I. Context

ALGA of UCLG Africa has identified the need for qualified multipliers who can build the capacities of local authorities on human rights. With its experience in providing training to local authorities, government officials and law enforcement agencies, the Centre offers a training to prospective human resource staff, staff trainers, human rights trainers and multipliers of human rights education with the aim to create a pool of trainers on the principle to "leave no-one behind".

II. Target group

The training-of-trainers (ToT) capacity building requires a small, pre-identified group of participants, therefore, participation is limited to max. 30 people to ensure engagement and professional exchange.

Participants have the opportunity and power to train, inform, exchange with, consult or accompany those who take decisions on or implement policies. They seek to deepen the impact and sustainability of their capacity building and training efforts by applying a human rights-based approach.

They are experts in their field of competence.

- Academics
- trainers and educators on different subjects
- officials in charge of developing human resources in local administrations
- consultants

The organizers particularly encourage to apply:

- Members of the network of Human Resources Managers of Local Governments in Africa (Local Africa HRnet) who can act as multipliers and henceforth integrate human rights standards in their staff training curriculum.



- Members of the ALGA Network of Coaches, Trainers, Experts and Resource Persons who are already vetted trainers and would benefit from human rights expertise.
- Qualified staff of the Anchoring Institutes of ALGA in Africa.

A formal certificate of participation is awarded.

III. Application

Application for the event is required. People interested to participate are invited to submit their application. The application form is available [HERE](#). The call is open until **24 September 2021**. Selected participants will be provided with links and access codes.

The participation is free of charge.

IV. Content

The toolkit for urban inclusion (the Toolkit, available for download [here](#)) is an excellent tool to promote a HRBA to local policy making that is practically relevant and created by cities for cities and multipliers to use. It provides city leaders and local government officials with practical tools and advice to build inclusive and sustainable cities. The Toolkit was developed by cities for cities; it documents the accumulated transferrable and tacit knowledge of participating cities, reflects their own experiences and compiles them into policy models.

This Training of Trainers workshop discusses two policy models and hands-on guidance on two topics of high relevance for cities:

Access to Information

Access to information is an essential enabler of urban inclusion and a prerequisite for effective public participation and citizenship and contributes to the achievement of human rights principles, notably transparency and accountability. The Toolkit provides tips and guidance for planning, implementing and evaluating access to information policies and programs in the city.

Public Participation

Public participation enables local authorities to make rational decisions concerning their cities, as it allows them to closely identify the priorities and needs of different groups of inhabitants, and to respond to these needs through adequate measures. The Toolkit explores and examines possible practical means to implement public participation at the local level.

V. Goals

As a result of each online training course, trainers and multipliers have guidance to identify and implement tools to promote urban inclusion, apply a human rights-based approach in their trainings and to share this knowledge with others, using the Toolkit.

The goals of each training course are to

- Apply the Toolkit for Urban Inclusion to promote a HRBA to local policy making to the context of target participants
- Provide knowledge and training skills on the human rights training methodology;
- Provide an opportunity for trainers and multipliers to enhance their capacities;
- Serve as a platform to share experiences and good practices and initiate in-depth learning among participants.
- Empower “Toolkit Ambassadors” who appreciate the relevance of the toolkit, apply and promote it and help to shape it further.

VI. Learning objectives

By the end of each course, participants will be able to:



- Recognise the importance of human rights for inclusive and sustainable cities;
- Apply the Toolkit in the training of their respective target groups;
- Increase sustainability and impact of their capacity building efforts by building on the experiences of other cities by using the Toolkit;
- Appreciate the integration of HRBA in their trainings as a matter of professionalism;
- Identify strategies to reach and motivate their respective target group.

VII. Pedagogical and methodological approach

This ToT workshop combines content and methodology with the aim to empower participants to be able to deliver trainings for their target groups, using the Toolkit.

The workshop follows a Human Rights-based Approach to Training. A HRBA helps to operationalize human rights principles into classroom practice and provides a guideline for the monitoring of education programmes. Therefore, human rights principles provide guidance for the implementation of the ToT workshop, as well as a yardstick for participants to analyse actions, programmes and policies of their target group in how well they fare respecting, protecting and fulfilling human rights. They are usually referred to using the acronym PANEL:

- P articipation
- A ccountability and Rule of Law
- N on-discrimination and vulnerable Groups
- E mpowerment
- L inkages to Human Rights framework, systems and standards

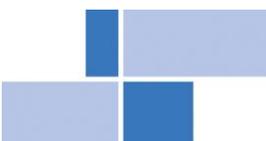
VIII. Modalities

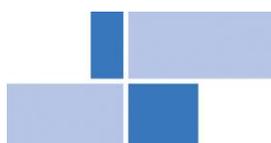

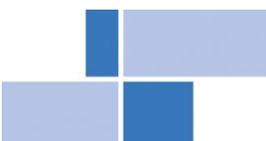
